The Board of Directors of the Fort Worth Community Land Trust (FWCLT) is delighted to announce Rebecca “Becky” Gligo as the organization's inaugural Executive Director. Becky will begin full time on October 14, 2024. In her role as Executive Director, Becky will lead FWCLT in its efforts to make homeownership attainable for working families. Alongside the FWCLT board, she is energized by the promise of the community land trust model to increase access to homeownership and promote long-term affordability in our rapidly growing city.

Becky has more than sixteen years of experience in housing policy, partnership development and program design across the country. Throughout her experiences in public service, nonprofit and consulting settings, Becky has demonstrated a commitment to collaboration, building consensus and centering the perspectives of clients and community members with relevant lived experience.

Prior to joining the Fort Worth Community Land Trust, Becky was the CEO of BPG Consulting where she consulted with housing authorities and affordable housing agencies on technical assistance, training and policy development.

Becky previously founded and served as the Executive Director for Housing Solutions, a nonprofit created to serve as the lead agency for a collective impact initiative known as “A Way Home for Tulsa.” In her role with Housing Solutions, Becky oversaw the implementation of the community-wide strategic plan to end homelessness, grew the collective from 30 to 55 member agencies, grew the staff of Housing Solutions to fourteen in the first year, and tripled community funding through HUD grants.

Prior to founding Housing Solutions, Becky served as the Housing Policy Director for the City of Tulsa where she was responsible for working with city and state housing agencies, non-profit entities, philanthropic organizations, and developers to achieve key outcomes of neighborhood revitalization and affordable housing preservation and development.

Becky’s deep personal commitment to fair, attainable housing first took root when she served as a high school teacher in Antioch, California. She observed how housing insecurity negatively affected her students’ ability to thrive in the classroom. Becky is passionate about ensuring that stable housing is within reach for all community members.

Becky holds a Master’s and Bachelor’s degree from the University of San Francisco. While her professional pursuits have taken her far and wide, she is proud to lay down roots in Fort Worth and looks forward to creating opportunities for others to do the same.

The Fort Worth Community Land Trust (FWCLT) is a 501c3 nonprofit organization working to increase attainable housing, particularly homeownership opportunities, among working families in Fort Worth.
